## James and the Giant Peach

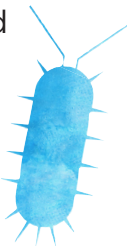
### Arriving at A.R.T.

**WHERE:** The A.R.T. is located at the Loeb Drama Center, **64 Brattle Street** in Harvard Square, Cambridge.

**WHEN:** Most performances begin at 10AM, 11AM, or 2PM. Check your ticket order to confirm your show time. Groups should arrive at least **30 minutes early**.

**WHO:** A.R.T. staff is here to welcome you. Ask the ticket services staff, ushers, hosts, or anyone wearing a nametag to help you find your way and answer your questions.

### At the Theater

**Pre-Show:** Enjoy some puppet-making, coloring, and dress-up activities in our lobby before the show begins!

*James and the Giant Peach* is an adaptation of the classic Roald Dahl story that many of us love! The show will last around 60 minutes with no intermission. Please note that music and dancing is a part of the show and a strobe effect is used during the play.

**After the Show:** Stick around to meet and take photos with some of your favorite characters!
